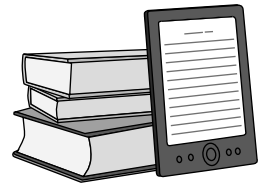
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Your summary should be about 100 words long (and no more than 120 words long). You should use your own words as far as possible.
