GRAMMAR: COMPARATIVES

Comparatives are used to compare two or more things and indicate the degree of difference between them. Adjectives are words that describe or modify nouns. When comparing using adjectives, we use comparative forms to show whether something has more or less of a particular quality than another thing. Here are different ways of comparing using adjectives:

Comparative Form with "-er":

This is the most common way to compare two things.

Example: The cat is faster than the dog.

Comparative Form with "more" or "less":

Used when an adjective has two or more syllables or ends in -y.

Example: She is more intelligent than her sister.

Superlative Form with "-est":

Used to compare one thing to all others in a group.

Example: The elephant is the largest animal in the zoo.

Superlative Form with "most" or "least":

Used when an adjective has two or more syllables or ends in -y.

Example: This is the most beautiful sunset I've ever seen.
